MCLE)	<p><b>Parent Rights: Who is in charge?:</b> Parent's rights are important and need to be acknowledged but how do parent's rights affect student privacy rights and District interests? Now, more than ever, some parents are demanding notice if their child has disclosed gender identity issues, some parents are seeking to review the content of school curriculum and books retained in school libraries. These issues have dominated board meeting discussions in many communities. Can/must schools disclose a student's gender identity to parents? Can parents opt their children out of curriculum that discusses LGBTQ+ or other controversial issues? Who has ultimate control over curriculum and books in a school's libraries? What laws guide this discussion? What is the board's role in this culture war? The training will also offer a framework for the hard discussions that districts have around police presence in schools, including: when it is appropriate (or required) for law enforcement to be called to school, who should be contacted (school resource officer? School district police officer? Fast forward to 2023, and the federal Department of Education will once again be revising its Title IX regulations for what is expected to be a fall 2023 implementation deadline.
