Additional support was provided through hiring a half-time expert teacher to support implementation and professional development. Data points will be gathered by test scores, enrollment of underrepresented groups in AP classes and AP scores of all students.

Accelerated Learning Labs: Keeping Students Moving Forward

Accelerated Learning Labs is a first-of-its-kind initiative for the district and is being implemented at all levels with the goal to increase students' learning by one year in the span of four months. About 1,500 students participate in this intervention that prioritizes the urgent literacy needs of students during the school day, when the program can reach the most children. The elementary model is a pull out program and at the secondary level, class sizes were reduced to 15 students. This program is replicable by making strategic budgetary decisions, utilizing teaching and administrative staff to support students' foundational skills, and implementing a clear instructional model.

The Arts for All: Let the Music Play is a comprehensive TK 8 instrumental program focused on: 1) engaging all students, 2) discovering and fostering a school family, and 3) connecting each student with a positive school mentor. The program has been recognized with a CSBA Golden Bell Award and a National School Board Magna Award. The program makes a significant difference in the lives of students; participating students' grades are 1.5 points higher, and they experience 50 percent fewer absences and more than a 60 percent decrease in discipline referrals. The number of students who have perfect attendance and zero discipline referrals is significantly higher in relationship to their non instrumental counterparts.

Salary Equalization: A Joint Effort to Cure Historic Salary Inequities
